Award-winning journalist Richard Harris reports on science issues for NPR's newsmagazines Morning Edition, All Things Considered, and Weekend Edition. Harris, who joined NPR in 1986, has traveled to the ends of the earth for NPR, reporting from Timbuktu to the South Pole, the Galapagos Islands to Beijing during the SARS epidemic, to the foot of Mt. Kilimanjaro.

In 2002, Harris was elected an honorary member of Sigma Xi, the scientific research society. He has won numerous awards, including the Sagan Award of the Council of Scientific Society Presidents (1999), the American Medical Writers Association's Walter C. Alvarez Memorial Award (1999), the American Association for the Advancement of Science/Whitaker Science Journalism Award (1995), a Peabody Award (1995), the Woods Hole Marine Biological Laboratory's Lewis Thomas Award for coverage of the life sciences (1992).



Harris co-founded the Washington, DC, Area Science Writers Association and is past president of the National Association of Science Writers. A California native, Harris was valedictorian of his college graduating class at UC Santa Cruz in 1980.
